Youth Empowerment thru Eviction Research (YEER)

This quarter Dr. Coston worked with the youth on police data - what we have access to, what we don't have access to (the politics of that...), how it can be used to support mapping to show the overlap between gun violence and evictions.

Dr. Odera joined in a meeting to support the youth in thinking about how they will conduct field interviews in the community they selected, which is Mosby Court. She helped them think through things like: how they will access the community, how will they approach folks, how will they ask questions about sensitive topics, how they will keep themselves & community members safe (from COVID-19) while collecting data, etc.



Along with our regular bagged groceries, we started delivering hot meals to some of our youth's families in August and will continue through October 28th. We also received a grant from the City of Richmond to include items like milk, eggs, orange juice and fruit.

We have 8 seniors in our regular programing this year, so we'll be really busy this school year with college/trade school planning for our college bound students and preparing others to enter the job field. Our Volunteer Higher Education Coordinators will turn the page on the college planning manuals to their 12th grade college planning activities.
