




In 2019 we graduated 16 students. With a 90% success rate in our students finding and keeping living wage employment, we expect most of them to stay employed and grow in their walk.








Our Student Housing Leaders Program ended in December 2019, however, we have been awarded another grant in 2020 to continue the program.

SUMMER WORK EXPERIENCE



In summer 2019 we received 5 students to work with us from the Mayors Youth Academy. We worked with them on projects to help prepare them with real work experience for

future workforce. Our program included effective communication skills, resume writing and interviewing techniques, conflict resolution and professional decorum, and other employability skills. But it wasn't all work and no play, we spent a day at the science museum.



HIGHER EDUCATION

This year most of our students were sophomores and juniors who became juniors and seniors in September so we're looking forward to some graduations in June 2020. In November we met Communities with the in Schools (CIS) representatives for John Marshall High School and Armstrong High School to develop a partnership with them. Through this partnership, we are now able to visit the schools once a month to meet with students and post our activities on their school boards.

Adopt a Senior

In recent decades, American society has become very segregated by age – youth attend agesegregated schools, adults rarely spend time with youth in their work environment, and senior citizens often live in housing with only other older adults. On the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of each month, we're breaking down many of the physical and social barriers between the generations and provide activities for seniors and youth that offer opportunities for mutually beneficial learning.

Things that youth are singled out for now are the exact opposite of things we were singled out for. The Resurgence class helps teach our youth that it's good to be

singled out for being the person doing the right thing. That's what leaders are made out of. These classes are held at St. Giles Presbyterian Church on Wednesday evenings, lead by one of our past Board Members. We're looking forward to the youth continuing with this class in 2020.

Word from our Executive Director

2019 was a good year for Saving Our Youth VA where we work to help produce socially responsible leaders. Students who join our program strive towards personal excellence, but also seek to utilize their talents to impact their communities. With 2019 marking our 10th year of service, I thought I'd share my story of why I'm so passionate about helping the youth reach their goals of going to college. Growing up in Newark NJ, and the public school system there, I found myself in a situation that so many students in public school here in Richmond find themselves in now. Graduating at the top of my class, I got into a good college. Unfortunately, although I graduated at the top of my class, I was not prepared for college and I was intellectually well below the others because they were taught at a much higher level than I was. For that reason, I refused to put my daughter in public schools and she is now a Medical Doctor specializing in infectious deceases. So, I thought perhaps I could help others reach their educational related goals as well.

However, with us reaching the students in high school, when it's a bit late to help in the say I helped my daughter, we changed our goal to assist students not only who want to go to college, but also to guide them to trade schools and help them find good jobs.

Since 2009, we've assisted over 100 youth find their way in this crazy mixed up world we live in and we're looking forward to helping many more in the years to come.
